## TOYS & EQUIPMENT FOR PLAYGROUP



## BELOW ARE SOME SUGGESTED TOYS AND EQUIPMENT TO INCLUDE AT YOUR PLAYGROUP

This is not an exhaustive list but is a guide as to what you might have at playgroup. As you require new/ more items they will help to encourage play, interaction and development in each child on different levels at your playgroup.

- A variety of balls
- Construction set and blocks (at least 20 pieces)
- · Washable dolls, doll beds & bedding
- Dress ups including bags, scarves, shoes, large mirror
- Baby toys including rattles, soft toys, washable or board books, cause and effect toys
- Large crayons, paste and paint brushes, non-spill paint pots, playdough rollers and cutters
- Paper of all shapes and sizes
- A variety of Puzzles ranging from simple to harder ones depending on your group
- Books to sit and read or be read to in a comfy corner
- Sets of cars, animals, trains, musical instruments, tea sets and cooking sets
- Buckets, spades, scoops, dump trucks and graders for the sandpit or a digging patch
- Push or pedal wheeled toys, walker wagons, pull along toys, dolls prams, wheelbarrows
- Floor rugs, play mats and large cushions to define play areas
- A place for hanging completed artwork eg clothes drying frame
- Tarpaulins, large squares of laminate or waterproof picnic rugs to protect the floor from messy pay activities
- Storage crates with lids for equipment and toys to be stored
- Furniture for small children including tables and chairs and child size smocks.

## **TOP TIPS:**

Provide multiples of the same toy to avoid unnecessary fights over the one toy.

Is it too small and as such a choking hazard? A good guide is if it can fit inside the old film cannisters it is too small for pre-schoolers

Keep an eye out for annual Toy Sales at the department stores such as BIG W and TARGET where you can pick up great bargains!

Buy good quality second hand toys & equipment through your local Opportunity Shops, recycle toy shops or online.

## 10 QUESTIONS TO ASK WHEN CHOOSING TOYS FOR PLAYGROUP

- 1. Is it durable? Will it withstand constant, heavy use? Should it be discarded because it is damaged?
- 2. Is it safe for all children or will it need to be used in a restrictive area?
- 3. Can it be easily cleaned?
- 4. Is it appropriate to the children's abilities? Can they use it on their own?
- 5. Does it encourage social interaction? Is it used individually?
- 6. Is it simple and versatile? Can it be used by children of different ages? Can it be used indoors & outdoors?
- 7. Does it give the opportunity to develop and practice new skills?
- 8. Does it have scope for the imagination and for experimentation?
- 9. Is it in line with the interests of this group of children?
- 10. What is the value? Does it entertain, encourage physical play, foster creativity or is it a tool for imaginative play?
